Acts 17: 24-29

The word 'isolate' can be so damaging. It can fill us with depression and despair or it can make us ask 'where is God in all this, what is he trying to say to us'.

Paul was in Athens - a city full of gods, even an unknown god. Paul was telling them about this unknown God who made all creation and gave us time and space.

Tuesday

Wednesday

Pray for all those contributing to church life in this lock down period. For the many who are contributing online encouragements and teaching, the Daily Prayers, Connected, the Home groups, the Toddlers Group on Wednesday mornings, the pastoral phone calls and the prayer chains.

Thursday

Pray for all the shops struggling to survive, all those people in our country without enough food and supplies, and the work of the Weston Food Bank and those serving in it. Please may we also pray for those helping in refugee camps in the Middle East and in Greece.

Friday

May we remember those whom we know, either personally or through church, who need God's healing touch in their lives at this time. We think especially of the families and friends of those who have passed away recently: Janet Webb (Janet's funeral is Thursday 28 May), Jean Hancock, and Brian Kellock (both these funerals are on Monday 01 June).

Saturday

May we pray for the Virtual Service tomorrow morning and pray for Tom and the team for skill in the presentation that it may be an effective tool of the gospel. May we give thanks for all the other services which have enabled us to worship with familiar voices.

My Journey of Faith Ray Pilgrim

Q. For how long have you been a Christian, and how did that come about?

A. I've been a Christian for 12 years, and I've always had a belief but it wasn't until I went to New Wine in 2008 with the family that I really made the commitment. It was in the evening Worship where Mick Pilavachi was speaking about Peter stepping out of the boat to meet Jesus and his preaching was a message that spoke to me, that led me to have an encounter with the Holy Spirit that opened my eyes to Jesus.

Q. Were you brought up in a Christian home?

A. Coming from a West Indian background both my parents were brought up through Church, so I always had that grounding in me, even although I didn't go to church on a regular basis growing up.

Q. What led you to do youth work, and how challenging (and rewarding!) can that be at times?

A. As with a lot of youth workers when asked this question they will say "it happened by chance," being in the right place at the wrong time (just joking). As with most things that happen in church there is always the ever-faithful volunteer that will step forward to lend a helping hand. That's how it all started for me as a volunteer; then over days, weeks, months and years I gained more experience, and enrolled on a youth workers' course to gain the qualifications needed to help me in my youth work.

Working with young people does have its ups and downs as their moods can change very quickly with no warning, but definitely without a doubt it is more rewarding than challenging, It's a real privilege to be someone they can come too, feel they can build a relationship of trust with, and be there to support and encourage them as they go through their journey growing up in life as they are becoming young adults.
