If you didn't know, a QR Code is basically a twodimensional barcode designed to be read quickly by smartphones. (QR stands for Quick Response).







Consider Time

I've been thinking about 'Time' quite a lot lately. It plays a dominant part in our lives and the Bible has quite a lot to say about it – either directly or indirectly. The Preacher in Ecclesiastes speaks of there being a specific time for every activity and stage of life: "A time to be born and a time to die", "A time to weep and a time to laugh", and so on (Eccles 3. 1-8). But generally he seems to have a rather pessimistic view of life: "What's the point of it all?" he asks. But later, in Chapter 12, he advises: "Remember your Creator in the days of your youth", and goes on to describe what life will be like as we advance into old age and eventual death.

We are often admonished not to 'waste time'. Time is a precious commodity, and we only have so much of it. It also seems to vary in speed at different stages of life. As a child, a year seems to stretch on forever between one Christmas and the next, and between one Birthday and another. But now we say: "Wherever has this year gone", or "Good heavens – is that the time!" One thing about time seems common to us all - we never seem to have enough of it! Isaac Watts, the 18th century hymn writer wrote: "Time like an everrolling stream bears all its sons away. They fly forgotten as a dream dies at the opening day". James, in his letter, says much the same thing. "What is your life?" he asks. "You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes away." Jesus was very much for living one day at a time. Thus we pray: "Give us this day our daily bread". He chides the farmer who told himself to put his feet up and take it easy, as he had 'goods laid up for many years'. "You fool", says Jesus. "This night your soul will be required of you!"

When Glenys and I lived in Sittingbourne we once visited a very Godly man. On his mantelpiece he had a small card, bearing just two words: "Perhaps Today". It certainly makes you think. Now obviously we don't want to be morbid about all this. Of course we make plans, book holidays, arrange to see friends, and so on. But we should never take life for granted. Time and distance are strongly linked, thus we measure speed in miles per hour. That's fine for terrestrial distances, but far too short if we want to measure how far away the stars and galaxies are. For this, the speed of light at 186,282 miles per second becomes the unit we use. On this reckoning, the sun is just over eight minutes away, and the nearest star about four light years. Some of the far distant objects in the visible universe may have ceased 'shining' centuries ago, but we continue to 'see' them, as their light is still hurtling towards us through space.

The English poet, Sydney Carter (1915 – 2004) gives us an amusing reflection on life in his poem 'Run the Film Backwards', which begins: "When I was eighty seven they took me from my coffin: they found a flannel nightshirt for me to travel off in." In verse eight, after various stages in his everyounger life, he finds himself as a toddler. To him "The trees are getting taller and the streets are getting wider. My mother is the world to me: and soon I'll be inside her". In the final verse he is in the darkness of the womb and his last plaintive thought is "Wherever can I be?"

Wherever indeed! Psalm 139 gives us a possible answer: "You saw me before I was born. Every day was recorded in your book." What implications may all this have for us as we affirm 'I believe in the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting'? If we run the film backwards the broken cup on the floor comes together again and leaps back on to the table, full of un-spilt tea. If time were to run backwards, the dead would indeed come back to life - but only once again to pop back inside their mothers. Not much point in that! So let's stop the clock at -say - 30 years of age. But time and motion are linked - so not much point either in being frozen in time and not able to move! We need another dimension altogether. In Revelation 10.8 an angel declares: "There shall be time no longer." 'Eternity' perhaps, a different dimension – not meaning a 'very long time', but a different state altogether, one we cannot comprehend at the moment. We shall just have to wait and see.
