Genesis 1

The way books begin is very important. The Bible has a great beginning which introduces us to the main character; tells us something about his power and is a bit mysterious - raising questions which make us want to keep reading.

The Bible won't answer all the questions we have but it does tell us everything we need to know about God and our relationship with him. And it does that, mainly, through a story the story of God and his people.

The beginning of the Bible runs like a musical motif through the rest of the story, singing out at its loudest when Jesus is introduced as the Word of God who made all things.

If the beginning of the Bible grabs you, let me encourage you to keep reading and discover the rest of the story.

The Peace

I'm grateful to Heather for sending in this poem. Heather writes:

"Many years ago I shared this poem to a member of our congregation who hated sharing the Peace. After they had read it they realised that they had interpreted the poem wrongly and from that day until her death, she loved sharing the Peace and was often the last person to resume her seat."

(If at first this seems like a difficult piece to read, try to have compassion on the person speaking and persevere to the end of it.)

<u> PAX</u>

I shall not go to church again They gave the peace You see My neighbour put his hands on mine. I do not care for that.

Many years have passed since I was touched, save by the priest's hand dismissing me. I do not care for it. I do not care for it. I have always kept myself to myself. My neighbour put his hands on mine And spoke to me.

I do not know now, how I could turn, place my own hands upon another's and speak to him. But this I did Impelled by this Peace.

I hate to touch, or to be touched, and now that dreaded thing is done I shall not go again. I have had to touch my neighbour, He had to touch me. I feel unclean. Continual washing will not make me clean.

The Peace, the Priest said. Is this then, Peace? The broken, shattered self that cries within? I have had to touch my neighbour and He touched me. I shall not go again. But wait. He was Christ - my neighbour who stood on either side of me.

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One of the most delightful aspects of watching online services is that we get to see some familiar faces. We see a few people we know welcoming us, reading the Bible passage or leading prayers and we see a few more preaching the sermons as weeks go by. But we can't talk to them, can we?
