Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord.

(Acts 3: 19)

Sermon Snippets

Acts 3: 11-20

We're continuing to look at the apostle Peter's speech to the crowd after the healing of the lame beggar. He sets out the facts first and then looks for a response. The facts are that this Jesus was "the author of life" (v 15); our very world was made through him and, as God, he sustains our very life and breath. Yet the deep irony was that a very similar crowd allowed life to be taken from him only a few short weeks before as he died on the cross. The wonder was that death could not hold him and he was raised back to life and brings life to all who follow him now.

That was quite a message but it wasn't given to them for "their information only" - no - this gospel demanded a response. . . and the first part of that was to recognise their own part in rejecting this 'author of life' and repent. What does that word "repent" actually mean for you and me? We weren't in Jerusalem 2,000 years ago but, in different ways, we've all pushed God's way to one side.

That's followed by the best of the gospel news - our sins wiped out and times of refreshing from God to come . . .

Who was St Valentine?

There are differing reports regarding this saint. It is even possible that there may have been two people of the same name! But who was he and why is 14th February known as 'Valentine's Day'?



The most common story was that in the 3rd century he was Bishop of the province of Terni in Umbria, central Italy and was placed under house arrest. The Basilica di San Valentino (pictured above) can be found in modern Terni. It is believed that Saint Valentine is buried there.

Having converted the local judge to Christianity, who then as a result released his Christian prisoners, Valentine was sent to Rome. He was alleged to be marrying Christian couples as well as helping Christians who were being persecuted.

It is generally agreed that he was martyred under the reign of Claudius II when Christianity was outlawed in the Roman Empire. In 496 AD Pope Gelasius marked February 14th as a celebration in honour of his martyrdom.

The first reference to the idea of St Valentine's Day being a special day for lovers comes in the Chaucer poem 'The Parliament of Fowls' written around 1382. The romantic tradition grew in Europe in the middle ages and became popular in England in the 18th century.

Church At Home Packs

Each week we produce a Church at Home Pack to go with the Bible Teaching from our Sunday Service. You can find them In the NOTES section underneath the

service on our website, just above the BULLETIN section where you can find the Connected newsletter!

The packs are full of ideas and material to help you think about and explore the teaching more over the week. We recognise that not everyone learns in the same way and that we each have different ways of meeting with God. With this in mind, the pack includes lots of different ideas, activities and suggestions. Each section has a different purpose and will appeal to people of different ages and stages of faith.

We start with 'Gather Together' which gives us a written prayer to start and a regular 'Action reminder'. The idea is to get yourself ready to meet with God. Some people really benefit from structure and repeated words or actions – just like the familiar things we say and do in a church service (The Liturgy).

The next section is 'Read Together' which includes two versions of the Bible passage from the service. Sometimes we include other versions if it is helpful. Looking at different versions of the same text can help our understanding and it's good to re-read the passage.

'Watch Together' follows next and this contains a number of videos on the theme of the sermon, some animated and some not. This section can be helpful for more visual learners and can provide a different perspective on the Bible passage or theme.

The next two sections are 'Talk Together' and 'Study Together'. For those who enjoy discussion or a Bible study, these sections are ideal. In fact, some of our Life Groups are using the packs each week as they meet over Zoom. The 'Talk Together' questions can be used in families, individually, or you could arrange to phone a friend each week and chat about them together – the same goes for the 'Study Together' section! Sharing experiences with people at all stages of the faith journey is really helpful!

There's so much good stuff here that it didn't all fit in this week! See next week's Connected for Part 2.
