Sermon Snippets

Genesis 11: 1-9

How high can you build a tower? I expect, like me, you've tried to see how high you can build a tower out of building blocks.

Truth is, it's never that high after all. The people who first lived in Babylon wanted to build such a tower - their folly was to think it could "reach into the heavens". In their arrogance, they thought they might start to become like God if they could get to him. Actually, as we realise, that was impossible - but the wonder of the Christian faith is that God hasn't asked us to make it all the way to him . . . rather He has come to us. This is the glory of our faith - that what to us was impossible was the very thing that God himself did. In Christ He came to us.

How much of your and my Christian life is trying to "build our own towers" i.e. to be godly but without God's help - and how much is accepting that He came to us and relying on His help and strength?

Coffee after the Service...

Faith in the Workplace - Sam Evans

You work in the operating theatre, yes? And I suppose most of the time the patients are unconscious and therefore you aren't actually talking to them? Yes, I do. We also have patients having a local anaesthetic, in which case it's my job to talk to them as much as possible to distract them!



Do you work with the same team all the time?

Mostly I do; the surgeons tend to stay the same, as the theatre deals with elective orthopaedics, so I have got to know them pretty well, but the scrub nurses can change. Last year, with Covid, we had more change of staff, and there are always students at various intervals. I enjoy teaching new people the ropes.

As there aren't the same opportunities to talk as say, working on a ward, do the people you work with know that you're a Christian?

A couple of them do; maybe I should talk about it more often. Someone once came and asked me if I was a Christian, though, and said I had that sort of air about me!

I imagine, in the theatre situation, it's easier to show that you're a Christian than to talk about it. If someone has noticed from how you act, then you must be doing something right!

I'd like to think that's right, because to me it isn't just a job, it's a lifestyle choice and I'm doing what I love. I always try to give a part of myself to the job; even if I'm not talking about my faith I am helping to improve people's lives and that gives me great joy.

You are fortunate in doing a job in which you can show Christian love.

Yea, definitely. Even if the patient is asleep, you are an advocate for that patient; you are speaking for them when they can't speak for themselves. You need to make sure everyone is following the rules so the patient is as safe as possible, and it is incredibly humbling to be that voice for them.

Is there much chance to talk during operations, or is everyone too focussed on what they are doing? Is it possible to build a rapport with each other?

During tricky parts of an operation a surgeon needs to concentrate, and I can tell when those times happen. Setting up, or suturing after an operation, we can talk; sometimes generally, sometimes about the op itself, but building team rapport is so important.

I remember from my nursing days the sense of awe I felt in the theatre at the workings of the human body. Do you feel that increased sense of awe?

Definitely. I've always been fascinated by the human body, and seeing how bones are fixed and that a patient with arthritis, say, will wake up without the pain they've been in, is amazing. Watching implants being custom-made for patients is so fascinating. I could talk about it for hours! It hits me every so often how fantastic the human body is.
