# **Sermon Snippets**

## Isaiah 55: 6-11 and Romans 8: 26-30

As Isaiah had been charged with telling God's people some hard truths about their disobedient life styles, so he clearly told them that God's ways were far higher than any one of theirs - see 'Verse For The Week' above. It was like comparing an elephant to a mouse. The elephant's viewpoint and understanding was so much greater than the mouse's - so God's viewpoint is so much greater than ours. He sees the beginning from the end, he knows the future, and he knows what is going on inside the mind of each of us.

So when Paul, writing to the Romans in chapter 8 verse 28, says "that in all things God works for good for those called according to his purposes", the good is not from our viewpoint - it is from God's. I have found it so difficult to pray for healing for a friend or relative and not have it answered with a "Yes". I ask the question 'why not or when?' God's' timing is quite different to ours.

It is much easier to deal with disappointments in my own life. Looking back over the years of walking with Jesus the disappointments have often proved to be junctions in the road that have lead to new opportunities. They have been times when I have had to learn new lessons of obedience, lessons of patience and humility.



The Bank Holidays Act was introduced in 1871 by banker-turned-politician Sir John Lubbock. Until that point, the Bank of England had been observing various saints days and religious festivals. The general population were allowed to take time off, though this would not have been in the form of holidays as we know it today, but on days based around the cycle of seasons. However, this varied across all the regions of the country, so Lubbock thought that some uniformity was needed.

According to Horace G. Hutchinson in the *Life of Sir John Lubbock, Lord Avebury, Volume 1*, his political aims were threefold:

- 1. To promote the study of Science, both in Secondary and Primary Schools
- 2. To quicken the repayment of the National Debt
- 3. To secure some additional holidays, and to shorten the hours of labour in shops

Why were they called Bank Holidays? While most employers were able to give their workers days off on 'public' holidays, it was difficult for banks to do so because the holders of bills of exchange had the power to require payment on those days.

The 1871 Act was revised 100 years later, with additional days added in 1974 (New Years Day), and 1978 (Early Spring).

Whatever you're doing this weekend, have a great Bank Holiday!

# **Prayer Pointers**

#### <u>Sunday</u>

During the coming week, Prayer Pointers will major on issues affecting Christian communities in the wider world. Pray for those in Northern Nigeria who have seen their homes and churches demolished, their children taken hostage and their pastor murdered by jihadist militants. Give thanks that we can freely attend church in this country.

### <u>Monday</u>

"O Lord, the clouds are gathering, the fire of judgement burns. How we have fallen." As we consider Afghanistan "we stand appalled to see your laws so scorned and lives so broken". We pray for those desperate to escape from that stricken country. There are a sizeable number of Christian Afghans, but they are scattered within a mainly Moslem population. Pray for them, for humanitarian aid workers, media correspondents and reporters, many with UK connections, desperate to reach Kabul Airport and transport to safer countries. We see scared children, clutching their toys. "God of the poor, friend of the weak, grant us compassion we pray. Melt our cold hearts, let tears fall like rain, come change our love from a spark to a flame" (Graham Kendrick, 1988 & 1993 Make Way Music)

#### <u>Tuesday</u>

Pray for the church family of Christ Church and Emmanuel. "If one member suffers, all suffer." We have suffered the loss of John Allchorne. But let us, this afternoon, remember his life with thankfulness for what he has meant to us as a valued member of our fellowship. The coffee always tasted better when John served it! Comfort those who mourn, especially Pat and close members of her family, Angeline and David White. Grant them, Lord, a "time to mourn" and in due course the courage to go forward, experiencing your continuing presence and purpose for them. *(Ecclesiastes 3: 4, 5.)* 

## Thanksgiving Service for John Allchorne

Just a reminder that the family have requested that people wear something aqua or purple -John's favourite colours. Don't worry if you don't have anything smart in those colours; the family are saying that 'colours are more important than formality'.

#### <u>Wednesday</u>

Pray especially for the women and girls of Afghanistan, who stand to lose most from the regime change and the reputation of the Taliban with regard to them. Pray too for the Services families here in the UK, who may well feel that the lives given to keep the peace during the past twenty years may have been in vain.

#### <u>Thursday</u>

Pray for the people of Haiti, who once again have suffered a devastating earthquake, with great loss of life. Pray for Marc Desmornes, Regional Manager of Christian Aid, who is trying to channel help to those rendered destitute. "We see families moving to wherever they can stay safe, with nothing but the clothes on their backs" (Church of England Newspaper)

## <u>Friday</u>

What is the greatest threat facing the human race at the present time? War? Plague? Famine? Natural Disasters? All these are with us right now – but the greatest, which we all thought was a generation away, is with us already: Climate Change! Pray for the forthcoming service at Christ Church on Sunday evening, September 5th. Reducing our individual 'carbon footprint' could seem futile, but collectively it can make a difference. #### <u>Saturday</u>

As we look forward to a pleasant Open Garden with Carl Evans this afternoon, give thanks and pray for an oasis of normality after a week of doom-laden events. Pray for those taking part in services at Christ Church and Emmanuel tomorrow, that all that they do will be under the control of the Holy Spirit.
