Sermon Snippets

John 19: 23-37

Mothering Sunday



This passage is perhaps arguably the saddest in the whole Bible. In the first century, widows (it would seem Joseph had died before Jesus' crucifixion) were unable to support themselves, so Jesus entrusted John with the care of his mother Mary.

This is a similar situation to many in the Ukraine are facing – handing a loved one over to another to look after.

Mary shows us the costliness of parenting, in watching her firstborn son, an innocent man, die on the cross. It wasn't easy being the mother of the son of God - even in the comparably good times - let alone at the foot of the cross.

In this week's sermon, I will explore how those keeping vigil at the foot of the cross, shaped the life of the church and its future ministry.

I will look at how the witness and actions of Jesus, Mary, John, Mary Magdalene and the women at the foot of the cross

- Reveal God's love;
- Were a threat to the power of Roman society and birthed a gentler, humbler more loving church;
- The inclusion of people like Mary Magdalene commits the church to taking seriously personal redemption and transformation;
- Revealed God's working in difficult situations;
- Encourage us to be fruitful as parents and non-parents.

2ND ANNIVERSARY OF DAILY PRAYERS



As far as I can see on my computer, the first "Daily Prayers" we recorded was 23rd March 2020. At that stage we were in the first lockdown and the future for all of us was unknown. Isolation was to become part of our lives. I remember sensing that two things were to become really important for all of us – being in touch with each other and being in touch with God.

We tackled the first with phone calls, life group zoom meets, practical help and the weekly "Connected". For the second need, I sensed a 5 minute guided time with God would also help.. and so "Daily Prayers" was born. This gave the opportunity to receive strength and guidance every day from God and not just reserving it for special occasions. A bit like we need to eat every day; so we need a bit of spiritual "daily bread" every day too!

Certainly this was true for those lockdown periods – but, in truth, it's always needed. I'd like to thank the team that loads them onto the website and Facebook and also those who record their thoughts for the occasional week.

As we mark the first two years of these prayers, it's encouraging to see every day we have about 35-50 "clicks" to access these prayers – they are quite easy to access – if you haven't already why not give them a try?

BOOK REVIEW. 'PHOEBE - A STORY' BY PAULA GOODER.


"There is a line from one of Gilbert and Sullivan's operettas in which a character asks the question: "Phoebe? Who on earth can she be?" And we might well ask the same question of Paula Gooder, who has written a book with the title, 'Phoebe - a Story'. Phoebe was in fact a real person, born near Corinth during the first century, who was entrusted by the Apostle Paul to carry his letter to the Christians living in Rome during the latter half of the first century. Pauls letter had much to do in establishing the Christian faith as we practice it today. The opening greetings and closing personal messages in all of Paul's thirteen surviving letters, inform us about 'ordinary people' (like us!) and how they lived out their day to day lives at a time when Christianity was beginning to take root in a pagan world. Most of them get just a brief mention by name, but Phoebe gets a full two verses in our Bibles (Romans 16:1).

'I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a servant of the church in Cenchrea. I ask you to receive her in the Lord in a way worthy of the saints and to give her any help she may need from you, for she has been a great help to many people, including me'.

Paula Gooder, a Theologian, Chancellor of St Paul's Cathedral and at some time a lecturer at Cuddeston Theological College, has taken up the story of Phoebe and given her flesh and blood, as it were, as she takes Paul's letter to Rome, where she meets Priscilla and her husband Aquila, Andronicas and Junias, Stachys and many others, who were living a communial life in Rome. We learn that as a young girl in Corinth, Phoebe had been frequently abused by her master, which resulted in the birth of a child, which was taken away from her to become the 'property' of her slave master, as was the custom at the time. Eventually, Phoebe was bought out of slavery by someone who took compassion on her and at some time around then, she became a Christian. So what became of Phoebe in Rome after she had delivered Paul's letter? To reveal much more would spoil the story for those who will read the book. The Christians living in Rome at that time endured a certain amount of mild physical and verbal abuse, bur nothing like the wholesale persecution and slaughter which was soon to be unleashed by the Emperor Nero. And what of Paul? The Christian community had been anticipating his arrival in Rome, but not to have been so long delayed, and certainly not as a prisoner in chains! Was this to be his end? Luke, who wrote about him in The Acts of the Apostles, was either reticent to tell us or else didn't know. Pauls intention was to go on to Iberia (Spain). Did he get there? Paula Gooder has given us a scholarly and highly readable story of Christians living in the first century. It is a period which we often see as containing the purist form of Christianity and one which we strive to emulate, so it is good to read about it.
