Pentecost















This Sunday is fifty days after Easter when we celebrate Pentecost, which is also known as Whit Sunday. At Pentecost, Christians commemorate the Holy Spirit coming down from heaven, filling the hearts of the gathered people in Jerusalem. Pentecost is one of the major feast days of the Christian calendar.

It wasn't an accident that so many faithful people were gathered together in Jerusalem that day. Jews and Christ-followers from the different regions were congregating in Jerusalem to celebrate Shauvot. Shavuot is a Jewish festival when the harvest is offered to God and when the community gratefully commemorated Moses receiving the law at Sinai. Something not dissimilar was happening again at Pentecost – God was equipping his people in Jerusalem as he did in Sinai.

A violent wind came from heaven and tongues of fire came to rest on the people gathered there. Everyone present was filled with the Holy Spirit which enabled them to speak in other languages. This is sometimes called speaking in tongues. Witnesses were perplexed and assumed they were drunk!



Before he died, Jesus promised his followers that he would not leave them as orphans (John 14:18) and, at Pentecost, this promise was fulfilled when the Holy Spirit descended. Jesus' death and resurrection coincided with Passover. So God's second great rescue (the redemption of human sin in the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus) took place on the celebration of his first great rescue (from the Egyptians). The coming of the Spirit and the giving of the law to Moses were both occasions when God offered a new way of life to his followers. Now that we have the Holy Spirit, we have everything we need to live between Jesus' first coming and his second coming.

Living by God's purposes can be remarkably ordinary (unlike the first Pentecost) - doing your job with integrity and compassion, being a caring and patient parent, or showing welcome and kindness to new people at church.

The Holy Spirit filling the Jews and Jesus' followers at Pentecost transformed the faith of those gathered on a personal level, but it also catalysed the church's development. As we gather this Sunday, we celebrate together the fact that we never walk alone and we aren't asked to undertake this task in our own strength, but by the power

and equipping of God's Spirit in us.

So, like those gathered in the upper room, let's come together this Pentecost Sunday with eager anticipation, with praise on our lips, and excitement for all the Lord is still commissioning and equipping us to do, as His witnesses 'in the all the world'.



Wells Cathedral Slavery Conference

This conference caught my attention against the background of the report on institutional racism in the Metropolitan Police and the 30th anniversary of the murder of Stephen Lawrence.

The conference followed a huge amount of preparatory work by the Cathedral, the University of Exeter and the Somerset African Caribbean Network as well as museums in Wells and Antigua & Barbuda.

Speakers talked about the trans-Atlantic slave trade; in particular 10 million Africans enslaved in the Caribbean. Rev Dr Carlton Turner from Jamaica talked about how Christian theology was distorted and used to support the subjugation of black people in the past. We also heard from Joy Lawrence, an historian in Antigua, who told us of conditions on plantations and highlighted that hundreds of years of inadequate diet and inhumane conditions have altered the DNA of the African population in the Caribbean so that they now have a very high incidence of hypertension and diabetes.

You may ask 'what is the connection to Wells?'. It lies in three families: the Trevelyans, Dickinsons, and Todways; absentee owners in Granada, Jamaica, and Antigua respectively. With their profits they leased land from the Cathedral which was in financial difficulties in the 18th Century. Donations followed to the Cathedral and other institutions and, gradually, members of these families began to populate the Cathedral Chapter. Some of our bishops benefitted from this but others were involved in campaigning for abolition. Even when slavery was made illegal, the plantation owners were given compensation by the government whilst freed slaves got nothing.

How do we respond to such an overwhelming history? Rev Turner called for a stance where we 'raise consciousness, deepen better connections, and ensure a different future'. I think that this conference contributes to such aims. Joy Lawrence talked about reparations in line with historical payments, for example from Germany to Israel after World War II. She made a case for the need amongst African Caribbean communities to develop education and healthcare and to encourage cultural awareness. She mentioned that the Trevelyan family has already voluntarily made apologies and donations concerning the actions of their ancestors, from whom they have inherited a privileged lifestyle.

Such a legacy is not solved by one conference, or one family's acknowledgement, but a process has started which we can hope and pray will be replicated and on-going into the future.
