TALK TOGETHER

- What do you find hardest about waiting for something?
- > Do you ever think about the fact that we are waiting for Jesus to return?
- What is the hardest thing about waiting for him to come back?

STUDY TOGETHER

Waiting is often part of our faith journey with God and there are many examples in the Bible of people who had to wait to see the answer to God's promises. A few are listed below. (You may think of other people/situations you'd like to discuss.) Read the passages, one section at a time, and discuss these questions:

PLAY TOGETHER

Everyone needs an identical sweet (*if you are playing this with very young children make sure you choose a sweet that they won't be able to choke on*). The idea is to make it last as long as possible.

When you say "Go", everyone puts the sweet in their mouth. After 30 seconds everyone sticks their tongue out with the sweet on it. Do this every 30 seconds. Can you be patient and not eat the sweet quickly all in one go?

The winner is the last person with some sweet left, when everyone else's has gone.

For very young children:

Playing games where they need to wait their turn will help their understanding of waiting for something fun!



MAKE TOGETHER

Advent Wreaths

To make a small wreath at home using **Birthday Candles and Salt Dough** (You could use **Playdough** too):



- 1. Mix 2 Cups of Plain Flour with one cup of table salt and add water, kneading until it is the consistency of playdough.
- 2. Mould the salt dough into a doughnut shape around a tealight candle and poke four birthday candles into the doughnut.
- 3. Add decoration by pressing in a pattern with a fork or cocktail stick.
- 4. Remove the candles and dry the dough in a cool over, or in a microwave in 10 second bursts.
- 5. When cool, you can paint the dough or add glitter, then put the candles back in.
- 6. Light the candles as we will do each Sunday of Advent in Church the middle one is for Christmas Day!

*Please be careful around lighted candles, keep them out of reach of small children and don't leave them unattended.

As an alternative – if you have Battery Candles:



Decorate a paper plate or a circle of card from your recycling with paper and pens (you can draw around you hand to make leaf shapes or use real greenery/leaves from the garden. Arrange your battery candles around the edge and place one in the centre. 'Light' the candles as we will do each Sunday of Advent in Church, keeping the middle one for Christmas Day!

Using the Salt Dough Recipe above and a birthday candle you could make an Advent Journey Spiral:

- 1. Once you have made the dough roll it out into a sausage shape and slightly flatten it on top.
- 2. Make the sausage shape into a spiral.
- 3. Take your candle and starting at the middle, make 25 dents (deep enough to let the candle stand up safely and securely)
- 4. Dry out the dough in the same way as for the Advent Wreath.
- 5. Every day during Advent move the candle one place along the spiral and light it, ending at the centre on Christmas Day!

*Again, please be careful around lighted candles, keep them out of reach of small children and don't leave them unattended.

Each time you light a candle – Pause, think, pray – you could even read part of the Christmas Story from one of the Gospels or a Bible Story Book.





REFLECT TOGETHER

A Sense of Wonder

(a reflection from the book 'A Year with Aslan' C.S. Lewis)



"They say Aslan is on the move – perhaps has already landed." And now a very curious thing happened. None of the children knew who Aslan was any more than you do; but the moment the Beaver had spoken these words everyone felt quite different. Perhaps it has sometimes happened to you in a dream that someone says something which you don't understand but in the dream it feels as if it had some enormous meaning – either a terrifying one which turns the whole dream into a nightmare or else a lovely meaning too lovely to put into words, which makes the dream so beautiful that you remember it all your life and are wishing you could get into that dream again. It was like that now. At the name of Aslan

each one of the children felt something jump in its inside. Edmund felt a sensation of mysterious horror. Peter felt suddenly brave and adventurous. Susan felt as if some delicious smell or some delightful strain of music had just floated by her. And Lucy got the feeling you have when you wake up in the morning and realize that it is the beginning of the holidays or the beginning of summer. (The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe)

- When was the last time you felt the sense of anticipation and wonder that the four children feel upon hearing Aslan's name?
- When you think about Jesus and his coming again how do you feel? Does something inside you jump in excitement or fear at the thought?
- You may have been a Christian for a long time or not very long at all. How can you keep a sense of awe and wonder at all that Jesus is?

As the world waits, may we wait with patience. As the world waits, may we wait with courage. As we wait, may we hold in our hearts the hope of the coming Lord, the love of the waiting God, the joy of the advent season. **Amen.**
