READ TOGETHER

Nehemiah 2: 4-16


⁴Then the king said to me, "What do you want?"

First I prayed to the God of heaven. ⁵ Then I answered the king, "Send me to the city in Judah where my ancestors are buried. I will rebuild it. Do this if you are willing and if I have pleased you."

⁶The queen was sitting next to the king. He asked me, "How long will your trip take? When will you get back?" It pleased the king to send me. So I set a time.

⁷I also said to him, "If you are willing, give me letters for the governors west of the Euphrates River. Tell them to let me pass safely through their lands on my way to Judah. ⁸ And may I have a letter for Asaph? He is the keeper of the king's forest. Tell him to give me timber. I will need it to make boards for the gates of the palace. It is by the Temple. The wood is also for the city wall and the house I will live in." So the king gave me the letters. This was because God was showing kindness to me. ⁹ So I went to the governors west of the Euphrates River. I gave them the king's letters. The king had also sent army officers and soldiers on horses with me.

¹⁰ Sanballat the Horonite and Tobiah the Ammonite leader heard about this. They were upset that someone had come to help the Israelites.



¹¹ I went to Jerusalem and stayed there three days. ¹² Then at night I started out with a few men. I had not told anyone what God had caused me to do for Jerusalem. There were no animals with me except the one I was riding.

¹³ It was night. I went out through the Valley Gate. I rode toward the Dragon Well and the Trash Gate. I was inspecting the walls of Jerusalem. They had been broken down. And the gates had been destroyed by fire. ¹⁴ Then I rode on toward the Fountain Gate and the King's Pool. But there was not enough room for the animal I was riding to get through. ¹⁵ So I went up the valley at night. I was inspecting the wall. Finally, I turned and went back in through the Valley Gate. ¹⁶ The officers did not know where I had gone or what I was doing. I had not yet said anything to the Jews, the priests, the important men or the officers. I had not said anything to any of the others who would do the work.


⁴The king said to me, "What is it you want?"

Then I prayed to the God of heaven, ⁵ and I answered the king, "If it pleases the king and if your servant has found favour in his sight, let him send me to the city in Judah where my ancestors are buried so that I can rebuild it."

⁶ Then the king, with the queen sitting beside him, asked me, "How long will your journey take, and when will you get back?" It pleased the king to send me; so I set a time.

⁷I also said to him, "If it pleases the king, may I have letters to the governors of Trans-Euphrates, so that they will provide me safe-conduct until I arrive in Judah? ⁸ And may I have a letter to Asaph, keeper of the royal park, so he will give me timber to make beams for the gates of the citadel by the temple and for the city wall and for the residence I will occupy?" And because the gracious hand of my God was on me, the king granted my requests. ⁹ So I went to the governors of Trans-Euphrates and gave them the king's letters. The king had also sent army officers and cavalry with me.

¹⁰ When Sanballat the Horonite and Tobiah the Ammonite official heard about this, they were very much disturbed that someone had come to promote the welfare of the Israelites.



¹¹ I went to Jerusalem, and after staying there three days ¹² I set out during the night with a few others. I had not told anyone what my God had put in my heart to do for Jerusalem. There were no mounts with me except the one I was riding on.

¹³ By night I went out through the Valley Gate toward the Jackal [a] Well and the Dung Gate, examining the walls of Jerusalem, which had been broken down, and its gates, which had been destroyed by fire. ¹⁴ Then I moved on toward the Fountain Gate and the King's Pool, but there was not enough room for my mount to get through; ¹⁵ so I went up the valley by night, examining the wall. Finally, I turned back and re-entered through the Valley Gate. ¹⁶ The officials did not know where I had gone or what I was doing, because as yet I had said nothing to the Jews or the priests or nobles or officials or any others who would be doing the work.

TALK TOGETHER

When you are faced with a problem or difficult situation – what do you do?


STUDY TOGETHER - Read Nehemiah 2: 1-16

- Why was Nehemiah afraid? (v2)
- How do you think the King could have responded to Nehemiah's explanation in verse 3?
- Why do you think he responded as he did?
- Have you ever had to ask someone for a lot of help or make a difficult request to someone? How did you approach it?
- How did Nehemiah approach this situation? (v4)
- Throughout the book of Nehemiah we see him turn to prayer read 1:4, 4:4 and 9, 6:9 and 14 for some examples of this. What does this tell you about Nehemiah?
- How does prayer help Nehemiah with his task?
- Verses 5 8 show us that Nehemiah had not only prayed but he had planned carefully, what he would need from the King.
- Nehemiah had confidence in God. He took his problem AND his plans to God in prayer. He
 prayed for a long time, as we read previously in chapter 1. God returned that confidence in
 moving the King's heart to give Nehemiah everything he needed. Nehemiah gives God the glory
 for this at the end of verse 8.
- In verses 9 16 we read that although some were unsupportive of Nehemiah's plans, he was able to carry on. When we looked at Chapter 3, a few weeks ago, we saw that the community came together to rebuild the walls, so giving Nehemiah confidence in the call God had placed on his life.
- What can we learn from Nehemiah's relationship with God?
- How is it possible to have confidence that our plans are in line with God's will?

PLAY TOGETHER

Using lego or Jenga bricks build a wall which is good and strong. As you place each brick, think of people in church and what they're good at (talking to people, singing, making drinks, making others welcome, teaching about God, etc.). Our church is made up of lots of different people using the gifts God has given them to show love to each other and to our town.

Don't forget about yourself. As you place one of the bricks, think about what God has made you good at and how you could use that to help others.



MAKE TOGETHER

'Bee like Nehemiah' Bookmark!

Larissa used the illustration of bees in a bee colony in her sermon today. To remind us of that and prompt us to learn from Nehemiah's example, why not make a 'Bee like Nehemiah' bookmark. It will fit nicely over the corner of the pages in your Bible and remind you to keep reading, learning and understanding God's word and his plans for your life.




You will need:

A square of paper (yellow if you have it)
A scrap of white paper
Scissors
Glue

Pens – Black (and yellow if you don't have yellow paper)

Fold the basic corner bookmark by following the pictures below:



Decorate with a face and black (and yellow) stripes. Cut out two 'teardrop' shapes for wings. Decorate them with the words 'Bee like Nehemiah' and stick them to the body of the bee. Once dry, place it over the corner of the pages in your Bible.

REFLECT TOGETHER

Nehemiah didn't just pray and he didn't just act – he did both!

Find a pebble in your garden or from somewhere outside. Close your eyes and think about the week ahead.

- ➤ Are there any difficult situations in your life or the lives of those you love?
- Are there things happening in our town, country or world which you want to bring to God?



Pick up the pebble and imagine it is you. As you pray, hold the pebble up to God and ask him to show you what to do to help make these difficult situations better.

PRAY TOGETHER

In Neh.2:4-5, Nehemiah offers up a silent prayer to God whilst he's talking to the King. As you go about your day, remember that you can talk to God in your mind and he can still hear you.

- When you're thankful for something PRAY!
- When you're feeling lonely PRAY!
- When you're happy PRAY!

Help me develop a practice of powerful, prolonged, and effective prayer, and use me in whatever way You choose to carry out Your plans and purposes in my life.


